

Grand Traveling, Global Pandemics, and Graduation - What I've Learned in the Last Year and a Half by Allison Wichtowski'17

I had just pulled up to the hotel in Rome, Italy, where I was going to be staying as I began what was supposed to be my epic adventure of a lifetime, when I first heard the words "Covid-19". I received a text from a fellow NDHS alumni who was also studying abroad in Rome, warning me with a picture from a news article that reported the first cases of the virus in the country's capital. He reassured me that his program said it was just a "flu-like virus" and nothing to worry about. This was the narrative I continued to hear throughout the month, as I studied and explored the treasures Rome had to offer. The anxious phone calls from home greatly contrasted the laid back

Italian culture. It wasn't until I began seeing signs in pharmacy windows indicating that they were completely sold out of face masks and hand sanitizer, that I began to realize just how serious this "new flu" was.

About 10 days later at 2 o'clock in the morning, I received an email from my study abroad program stating that the CDC had issued a level 3 warning in Italy & all non-essential travel should be avoided. On March 2, 2020, I packed my bags and left, touching down in Philadelphia with a hundred other college students. Cameras from local news stations were thrust in our faces with reporters asking how we felt about leaving the epicenter of the pandemic. At the time, I was informed by my personal healthcare provider & the NYS Department of Health that my family and I would be fine and a quarantine was not necessary. Four days later, the County Health Department called, mandating that I needed to be in complete isolation from my family and the outside world, as the risk of my possible exposure to the virus was too high.

I feel confident when I say that this past year and a half has been difficult for everyone. However, I still have hope. During a time of uncertainty and confusion, people have shown just how powerful human connection and empathy can be. Although the words "we're all in this together" may sound cliché, the message rings true. I have been able to overcome all of the challenges of the past year because of the people who supported me every step of the way.

In May 2021, I graduated from St. John Fisher College with a Bachelor of Science degree in Inclusive Childhood Education with a concentration in English Literature. To be completely honest, I thought the day would never come. In the fall of 2020, SJFC had to shut down for the second time due to Covid-19. I had to complete my course work virtually while also completing some of my pre-student teaching hours via zoom. Trying to develop personal connections with students through a computer screen is no easy feat, but I witnessed some amazing connections being formed despite the impossible nature of the task. Fifth grade students would write messages on paper and hold them up to the screen during their lunch period, so that they could try to communicate with their friends. If that isn't resilience, I'm not sure what is. In the spring semester, I was assigned to complete my student teaching in a sixth grade ELA class at Bay Trail Middle School in Penfield, NY. The students were attending school on a hybrid model, two days in person and three days at home in a virtual setting. Despite the students being hybrid, I was fortunate enough to go into the building five days a week. I was finally able to build connections with students and colleagues face-to-face. These connections motivated and reassured me that I was capable of accomplishing difficult tasks and making it through the last few months of my undergraduate years.

I loved this community so much that I decided to stay on as a substitute teacher after graduation and was hired to be a teacher for the middle school special education classroom for the summer. In the fall, I plan to start graduate school in pursuit of a master's degree in Curriculum Development and Instructional Technology. I am currently in the process of looking for a full-time teaching job in the Rochester area and am very hopeful that the connections and relationships I have made and developed in this past year will help lead me to whatever is destined to come next in my journey.



On May 6, a newly erected greenhouse on the Notre Dame campus was dedicated to Karen Jennings in honor of her years of service and dedication to ND. The construction of the greenhouse was funded through a Catholic Climate Covenant grant with the goal of growing native nectar and milkweed plants for the ND oncampus monarch habitat. In addition, the greenhouse will be used to support educational activities and projects for Notre Dame science students. The grant will also cover the purchase of a compost bin, so that cafeteria waste can be composted. The composting initiative will be used to educate the student body about counteracting the "throwaway culture". Future projects will include the development of an on-campus community garden.

Of note, the actual building of the greenhouse was undertaken by ND Sophmore Neal Moore for his Eagle Scout project.

ART DEPARTMENT




















The theme of this year's Crusader Carnival was "Choose Ki**ND**ness Day" in honor and memory of Rebecca ("Beckie") Ryan'17.
